A Word from the Head

Welcome back to the spring term. There's lots planned for this term and some new faces. Firstly, we welcome Sarah Watson as our new French teacher and Natalie Renwick as a new teaching assistant, working with Dragonflies Class in the mornings. Another new face is Katie Netley who has taken on an after-school pottery club with the school's new kiln. Getting pottery up and running in the school has been a long ambition and I am delighted that the children will have the opportunity to work with a potter in this club. Katie is also hoping to work with class teachers to support topic-related pottery opportunities. Another new face will be Anthony Knight, an experienced local car builder and engineer, who will be working with Andy Taylor and a group of six dedicated mechanics from Otters in another after-school club to build a Goblin kit car. We will hopefully be racing the car in meets in the summer term – more on that later.

The Seven C's

At last term's Rother Valley Locality Conference for teachers from across the Rother Valley's primary schools, held at Easebourne, the keynote speaker was Bill Lucas, Director of the Centre for Real-World Learning and Professor of Learning at the University of Winchester. As a teaching staff, we were inspired by Bill's passion and vision. In subsequent discussions and at staff meetings, we talked further about adjusting our approach to align it with the 7 C's which Bill argued should underpin a modern approach to education.

This half-term, we are introducing the 7 C's, one at a time, to begin slowly to change how we help our children think about their learning. Last week, we talked about **Curiosity** with the children and this week, the focus has been on **Creativity**.

Projects

Your child might have mentioned 'projects' to you this term. If they were really paying attention at the end of last term, they might even have mentioned them to you over the Christmas holiday!

Essentially, children can choose to design a project on a subject of their choice. The only physical restriction is that it has to fit into an A2 frame (minus a centimetre border around each edge) and be good enough to be put on display. To help, each child will be allocated a member of staff to help with the project.

Over the course of working on this project, he/she will have to demonstrate to the mentor that he/she has demonstrated the 7 C's (see above) in some way. The intention is to achieve a project of quality and I have asked staff to set the bar high. We are actively encouraging children to review and edit their work to make improvements. We are stressing that there is **no time limit** and that it doesn't matter how many times the child revises or adds to the project, though maintaining enthusiasm is of course an issue! Although not essential, parental interest and support are always welcome, as long as the child's role is clear.

To kick-start the initiative, certain members of staff are putting together projects of their own, to show how different the approaches can be. These are going up on display as they are completed.

This is an **experimental initiative**. It is not compulsory; it is something the children can choose to do. Some will not be interested whilst others will probably start but not finish. Hopefully, however, a good number will see the project to fruition and their work will go up on display and that will be very satisfying both for them and for us!

Debate Club

On Friday, 20th January, we will have our first debate club meeting of the term. This will run after school and finish by 4 o'clock. The motion, suggested by a child in Foxes, is that this House believes that the general public in America should be banned from owning guns. Audience members are very welcome!

Well-being Questionnaire

We are introducing a simple questionnaire for children and for staff as the start of a long-term wellbeing monitoring programme. Children will be asked to give graded responses to 12 simple questions to help us build up a picture of well-being across the school and to address any key areas. It is hoped that this questionnaire will be conducted at least annually from now on.

Church Choir (from Mary Knight)

The young people in the church choir of St.Mary's, Easebourne recently gained their Bronze Award from the Royal School of Church Music with very good marks, and their medals will be formally presented in Chichester Cathedral at the Diocesan Festival in May. All three are now at secondary school but they joined the choir as juniors and now make a valuable contribution to Sunday morning worship and occasional special services such as the Carol Service, weddings and so on.

Through singing in the choir the children learn to use their voices well, meaning correct breathing, projection, pitch and articulation, so that they sing with confidence. They learn to read the music so that they can sing at sight and understand the musical directions of the pieces they perform. They become familiar with music from the Middle Ages to the present day and appreciate the requirements of the differing styles. Most importantly, they come to realise the significance of their part in the services, and through the hymns and anthems that they sing, gain an understanding of the Christian faith

Children who enjoy singing and are willing to commit to an hour's practice once a week and morning service each Sunday are very welcome to come and audition for the choir. In addition, anyone wishing to study the organ can do so, but they must join the church choir first. A bursary scheme exists to encourage young people in choral and organ music.

Procedures in the event of school closure due to inclement weather

The decision to close the school in the event of inclement weather is not taken lightly and is based on the safety of both pupils and staff, some of whom have to travel quite a considerable distance.

Should we have to close at any point during the winter months, we will endeavour to make a decision by 7.30am and the closure will be posted



on the school's website at: <u>http://www.easebourne.w-sussex.sch.uk</u>. Closures will also be posted on the West Sussex County Council website at: <u>http://www.westsussex.gov.uk</u>. We will also send a text message to parents.

Some of our school bus pupils live in rural areas and we will have to be guided by our transport provider's ability to operate a safe service.

There may be circumstances when the decision is taken to close during the school day due to rapidly changing weather conditions. In these cases parents will be sent a text message. A member of staff will remain at the school with the children until the last child has been collected.

If the school is open and your child is unable to get in, please notify the office by 9.30am leaving a message on the absence line. After-school clubs will be cancelled if the weather conditions are poor. Children should wear appropriate clothing for the conditions, including waterproof footwear to go out to play i.e. wellington or snow boots and a change of footwear for class. A coat, hat, a pair of gloves and a change of socks would also be advisable.
