A Word from the Head

There has been, as you probably know, a good deal of sickness, with diarrhoea and vomiting featuring as symptoms. Could I remind all parents that we recommend children are kept off for 48 hours after their last bout of sickness or diarrhoea in order to reduce the chance of infecting other children? This is especially important at the moment as we currently have a child with a dangerously low immune system and if he were to catch a sick bug it would mean an extended amount of time off school and a stay in hospital.

Thank you too all those parents who filled in the questionnaire from the governors. The feedback is very useful and helps to identify where we might need to rethink things. We often feel we would like to talk to those parents who have concerns to find out a little more about what is going wrong and this is obviously impossible if the questionnaires are returned anonymously. If you would like to discuss an issue you have raised but completed an anonymous return, please do consider contacting the school to arrange a chat.

At parent meetings, two parents offered to train up as drivers. This was very kind but I promptly forgot who made the offers! If you are one of those parents, please do drop your name in at Reception and accept my apologies. We would like to get a driving examiner over for a whole day (four 2-hour sessions); if there are any other potential drivers, please let us know and we can then begin to increase our pool of drivers.

We have been unable to take the hen project forward as we didn't have any volunteers for last Saturday's working party to complete the fencing. This will be added to the job list of our premises manager, Graham Stonard and we now hope to have it finished by the start of the summer term.
