

On Monday afternoon, Dragonflies were lucky enough to join the circus entertainers for a circus workshop. They were shown how to spin plates and pass them to each other and how to transfer the plate from their stick to their finger and back. They were also shown how to juggle with a scarf, throwing it and catching it with different parts of their body.

#### **ECO CLUB**:

Last Friday, the Eco-Warriors visited the wild part of God's Acre, the churchyard of St Mary's to photograph what they found, using ipads. After half-term, they intend to identify as many of the plants as they can, using the Plantnet app. As well as plants, they also found a number of creatures, including this one, snapped by Vicky (Y4H) as it negotiated a tricky corner! Meanwhile, James (Y4D) has started to catalogue all the trees that form the labyrinth hedge walls. I hope that we will be able to share both surveys with you after halfterm.



## KS<sub>1</sub>

Hedgehogs - This week the children were asked to recall their learning so far in science, including plant parts and their characteristics. They used their knowledge of plants and observational skills they had gained to identify and study a tree. The children went outside and drew a diagram of their favourite tree; they then labelled its parts and named its location. They observed the size, shape, colour, and texture of the tree's roots, trunk, and bark, using scientific vocabulary to describe their observations. They looked for evidence of any flowers and collected a leaf from the tree. The children looked at the shape of the leaf and observed the blade, margin and veins with a hand lens. They then drew a labelled diagram of the tree's leaf. We finally looked at the shape of the leaf and compared them to deciduous and evergreen trees to decide what type of tree they had drawn.

Squirrels - This half term, Squirrels Yellow and Green teams have been in the forest with Mr T. They learned how to tie knots and made a log dog. A log dog is where you find some nice, bumpy, fat wood and tie string under it and make a handle. Then you can take it for a walk! The long piece of string is an elephant and the short piece of string is the mouse. The mouse goes around the elephant and then the elephant faints away from you. Then the mouse gets scared and runs over itself and under itself and over itself again. Then you pull it tight together and you have a bow hitch knot...is that right Mr T??

Rabbits - We had the most incredible time learning circus skills at the start of the week - first we learned to juggle with scarves; we spun plates, and then we could use the flower stick or go on peddles. We learned the saying 'throw, throw, catch, catch' to help us do this efficiently. We have had lots of fun in English this week, imagining a place that we want to time travel back too, ready to write our own time travelling novels. We drew something from the time we wanted to travel to and made sure that there was something on it that we could touch (a button) to take us back through the portal, for example, memories, and we touched a globe to transport us back to a time in our memory. This has been inspired from our work on the 'Time slip scarab'. We have also enjoyed being creative with our response to RE this week, where we have been thinking and discussing the importance of water, what it symbolises and how important it is. We will be linking this to our key question 'What is the trinity?'.

Badgers D & H - What a start to our week! You might even say Monday morning had a touch of Pazaz - Circus Pazaz, that is!!

Many of you will have come at the weekend to see the circus the PTFA arranged, but we had back stage passes... Both Year 4 classes headed up to the Big Top Tent first thing on Monday and were met by Paddy the ringmaster, Tilly Twist, CJ and Foolish Jake. They taught us how to juggle and then how to spin plates and do tricks with them. They then set up some other equipment for us to try, such as the diablos, the flower sticks, hula hoops, push & go pedals, poi and ribbons.... we all had so much fun.

Foxes - In Maths, we have been finding prime factors and common factors. To find these, we have been using factor bags. We have also been writing odes in English an ode is a poem about a person, place or idea and it links to our Ancient Greek topic. We have enjoyed doing gender identity work on non-binary, transgender and cisgender. By Scarlette and Lily.

Otters - Over the last two weeks we have been studying a book called 'Alien Nation' to learn more about gender identity. The lessons have been really interesting. We have discussed things in groups, answered quizzes and played games, all of which has helped our understanding of 'difference', 'discrimination' and 'ally'.
