Following the last Supercar Challenge, we have had a steady trickle of entries for the next Lego Challenge set by our Year 6 pupils, to build a treehouse! Our Year 6 judges have been busy deciding which criteria they want to use when they judge next week. They have decided that these will include Height, Strength, Style, Colour and Accessories.

Meanwhile, the final Lego Challenge has been set by the Year 6 judges. This time, children are invited to create a ROCKET. The deadline for this competition will be Monday, 11th July.

EYFS AND KS1

Dragonflies - Just before half term, Dragonflies visited Midhurst Library. We were welcomed by the librarian who talked about the lovely selection of children's books they have there. The children listened to a story and also discussed their favourite books. They spent some time looking through the books in the reading nooks too!

Hedgehogs - It has been a very short week but we have packed a lot in and have lots more to look forward to this term! In Design Technology, the children looked carefully at London taxi photos and discussed their characteristics. They then had the task of designing a model London taxi with either fixed or moving axles. The children discussed their ideas and were encouraged to think about how they could change or improve the London taxi design. As a class, they chose and recorded at least three essential design criteria that all their taxis must have, such as two axles and four wheels, headlights, a roof, and seats for at least two passengers. The children designed and labelled their taxis and worked in pairs to create their designs using various materials.

Squirrels - Over the last couple of weeks, the children in Squirrels and Lego Club have shown a real interest in building treehouses for Mr Culley's competition. We have had all sorts of amazing and wonderful designs from castles with battlements to ones with swimming pools, helipads, rooftop gardens, rainbow staircases and everything in-between. It has been really fun to watch the children display such creativity and describe their models with such enthusiasm.

KS2

Rabbits - There has been much excitement in Rabbits this week as we started to look at tomb builders in Design and Technology. This began with us researching different systems, specifically how machines work. Maths has been full of fractions, using the correct mathematical terms for the top and bottom of a fraction (numerator and denominator) while also stretching our knowledge of groupings and division. English has been exciting too; we have been applying all the skills we learnt when the circus visited to really immerse ourselves in our new text 'Leon and the Place Between'.

Badgers - 4D & 4H joined forces again this week, taking their first steps towards their exciting John Muir Award. We travelled to Iping Common, where we met representatives from the Sussex Wildlife Trust. The children took part in a heathland bug hunt using sweeper nets - several rare species were spotted! They also had a scavenger hunt, looking for animal stamps and identifying a variety of skulls and skins! In the afternoon, they built dens for animals (the fluffy toy kind) and bugs. It was a wonderful day and we are really grateful to the superstar adults that accompanied us.

Foxes - This week, Foxes have been extremely busy learning about ancient Greece. As part of our English lessons, we have explored the city states of Athens and Sparta. We compared the two cultures and decided which we would have preferred to have lived in. RE has been really exciting too, as we have started to explore the gospels. We found out that the gospels were a way of spreading 'good news'. We focused on the messages Jesus gave through his teaching such as the Sermon on the Mount. We even got to build houses on sand and mud to replicate the parable of the wise and foolish builders — it was so much fun!

Otters - Year 6 have come back this term absolutely raring to go! We started the week by tackling some long division. This was new learning for us and we persevered really well. In English, we have been working on our editing and redrafting skills by revisiting some older pieces of writing and improving them. It has been great to work together to find improvements and we are very proud of our finished pieces. On Thursday, we welcomed Mr Edwards from MRC who came to greet us, ready for September. He told us lots of information about secondary school and made us feel welcome and excited. It was good to be able to ask some questions and we are looking forward to our transition visit next month.

Goblin Update

On 28th May, the Saturday after the start of school half-term, most of our after school Goblin club met at Seaford College for a Goblin meet. The children were divided into two teams, each driving one of our Goblin cars, and every child had an opportunity to push/drive in one of the events.

Andy Taylor and Anthony Knight made sure that everything went as smoothly as possible and everyone had a great day. The school came away with the award for the best presented team. Well done, Team Easebourne!!!

Shoe Box.*



Step 1 -

Find a medium sized Shoe Box.

If you haven't got one at home most Shoe Shops will have those or even your local Charity Shops.



Step 2 -

Fill your box.

See our Gift Suggestions below.

Step 3 -

Personalise your Box.

Label your Box.

Boy or Girl and Age.

Step 4 -

Close your Box with a elastic band and take it to your collection point.



The following are suggestions for what should be in each shoe-box:

Hygiene items: Brush / comb, toothbrush (with holder if possible), flannel, soap (& soap dish if possible).

School items: Drawing/writing/colouring pad, pencil case (containing at least: 4 pens, 4 pencils, 2 pencil sharpeners, rubber, ruler), colouring pens/pencils, solar calculators, stencil, crayons, glue stick, watercolour paint palette and brushes, play-dough.

Toys: Skipping rope, doll, teddy, jigsaw, ball, yo-yo, musical instrument, cars, snap cards (not playing cards), magnifying glass, travel games, E.G. Ludo, draughts, snakes & ladders, finger puppets, small craft sets / lego sets.

Other items: Scarf/gloves/cap, sunglasses, hair items, Jewellery (bracelets, necklace, rings), wind up torch, sewing set (for older girls), stick deodorant, lip salve, drinks flask, small bag / purse.

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The above list is not exhaustive, there are many other items that could also go in but NO liquids or breakable items and nothing that could be related to war.
