Please could I ask parents not to let their children climb the banks around the school. Traffic up and down the banks not only ruins the grass but some areas have been planted with spring flowering bulbs.

Parking

Although blessed with a larger car park than most primary schools of a similar size in the Rother Valley, ours can still become congested and I know that some parents park in neighbouring roads. This is very helpful and I am grateful to them as this not only helps to relieve the pressure but also gives children some exercise on their way to and from school. However, we have received a plea from the residents of Highfield Close. Their very reasonable request is that cars are not parked so far up on the pavement that it becomes impossible to actually pass the cars with a pram. Please could parents bear this in mind when parking?

There are still ongoing issues within our car park and I would remind parents that:

- 1. We have three disabled parking bays, two next to the minibuses and one at the end of the staff parking area. With the pressure on parking spaces, these do apparently get used by drivers of cars which are not displaying blue badges. This means that disabled drivers are struggling to find a parking space to enable them to pick up their children or grandchildren. PLEASE could drivers leave these spaces free and be mindful that not all disabilities are obvious.
- 2. Previously, you might recall an incident where a car was parked behind the drop-off zone and the driver reversed into a mother who was crossing behind her with two children. Thankfully no one was hurt. **PLEASE** could drivers refrain from parking in front of, behind and over the crossing. **PLEASE** could pedestrians make sure they cross using the crossing.
- 3. Some parents are parking their cars outside the designated spaces in the car park this causes confusion, congestion and makes manoeuvring in and out of spaces more difficult and is dangerous for pedestrians using the car park.
- 4. Finally, it is still apparent that people are leaving their cars in the drop-off zone at the front of the school. This is not what it is intended for. If we can keep it free for dropping off, the traffic will flow more smoothly and cars will be able to leave the site quickly, reducing congestion.
 PLEASE don't park in the drop-off zone but just drop off. There should be absolutely no necessity to park in the drop-off zone at 2.30pm when the rest of the car park is empty.

Second Hand Uniform



Fairtrade Fortnight

The campaign for this year's Fairtrade Fortnight is 'She Deserves a Living Income' and focuses on women cocoa farmers. The fortnight launches as we return from half-term and we have ordered fairtrade resources to celebrate this.

There will be a house competition to collect the packaging from fairtrade products and display them in the library as we have done once before, so start setting your fairtrade packaging aside. I also plan to meet with the school council as well to see whether they have any other ideas which we can tell you

about before we enter half-term. Watch this space!

Maths Mastery Parent/Pupil Workshops (Years 1-6)

After half term we are holding a series of workshops for parents to attend. The first of these will be on Thursday 28th February for Years 5 and 6, followed by Years 3 and 4 on Thursday 7th March and finishing with Years 1 and 2 on Thursday 14th March.

Since the start of the Spring term we have begun to introduce a mastery approach to our teaching and learning in mathematics. The mastery-learning model means spending greater time going into depth when learning a concept or procedure and not racing through the curriculum. Rushing through content can lead to some children having large gaps in subject knowledge because the concept they had just learnt was either too big or learnt too quickly. A mastery approach means that we are taking learning at a steadier and deeper pace, trying to ensure that children are not left behind; as well as providing deeper and richer experiences for children who are above the national expectations for their age. We are focusing on all children achieving what is expected of their age group.

Pet Debate

Last Friday, a small group gathered to hear four children from Otters Class debate whether every child should have a pet.

Isla and Tam spoke for the motion. They pointed out that pets lead to lower blood pressure in their owners, as well as a more physically active lifestyles and lower cholesterol. Children with pets tend to get outside more and enjoy more fresh air and you can have fun with a pet, even a ferret! Plus, of course, pets are really cute!

Kitty and Theo W spoke against the motion. Kitty's arguments included the fact that pets' shorter lives mean that children have to deal with the death of animals with which they have developed emotional attachments. Pets can also trigger allergic reactions in children. Kitty also explained that pets can disrupt children's sleep. This side also produced statistics about the number of deaths from dog attacks in the US. Kitty also pointed out that parents often get stuck with the care of pets as children don't always honour their promises to care for their pets!

After some tricky questions from the floor, including the impact of universal pet ownership on the future of zoos, a second vote was taken. In the end, Kitty and Theo managed to persuade more people to their side and they carried the day. Well done to all four speakers, especially to Tam who stepped in at the last moment to cover.
