Dragonflies Class

This term in Dragonflies Class we have enjoyed celebrating Chinese New Year. In P.E. the children all took it in turns to do a dragon dance whilst the rest of the class played instruments to accompany the Chinese music.







We learnt about all types of Chinese food and we even tried some rice and prawn crackers too. Some of us didn't really like the rice, but we all loved the prawn crackers! We enjoyed them so much that we now have a Chinese restaurant in our class role play area.



We also painted Chinese dragons and made lanterns too. As we developed our knowledge of the culture we found out that 2019 is the year of the pig. We read the story of Pig in the Pond and then wrote about it. Our work is on display in our classroom together with our painted pictures of pigs. We have also learnt about capacity by using different sized scoops



to fill pots up with dried rice and we have developed our fine motor skills by practising to pick up objects with chopsticks. It has been lots of fun.

Hedgehogs Class

This term has been packed full of Traditional Fairy Tales. We started the topic with a trip to Chichester



College to see Alice in Wonderland performed by some of the drama students which was an exciting experience. We have

acted, sequenced and retold some fairy tales and created some fantastic art works to accompany our writing. The children have really enjoyed hearing different versions of the fairy



tales and comparing them to the originals.

In RE we have been learning about Creation where we used our torches to recreate God's light. In Science we created clouds, a water cycle and drew, painted and collaged the creatures of the world.

In maths we have been learning how to use centimetres and how to use a ruler accurately. We have been measuring everything in the classroom!

Squirrels Class

This term Squirrels have been busy exploring.

Our learning about Ernest Shackleton's great achievements led us to re-creating his expedition. We all had fun making a snow and ice scene with bubbles!







We have used torches to investigate how shadows are created and have explored how to change the shape of a shadow.

Our RE learning has been finding out about Rosh Hashanah. We have thought about how it is important to say sorry and to think about how you

can be a better person. We all enjoyed the Jewish tradition of

hoping for a sweet New Year by eating apples and honey.



The 'Alice in Wonderland' trip and the 'Leon and the Place Between' text helped us to use our imaginations to write stories and create art work. We have had a

fantastic end to the half-term with a Mad Hatter's Tea Party to celebrate all of our hard work.

Rabbits Class

In Rabbits Class, this half term, we have begun exploring our topic 'Rainforests'. We have been learning about Orangutans and



deforestation. We watched an advert that was banned from the television, 'There is a rang-tan in my bedroom'. We spent a long time discussing it and how powerful the video is for the world. As a class we debated whether it should have been

televised or not and it was decided that it should have been, because deforestation for Palm oil has become a big problem. Alongside this video we also read 'The Great Kapok Tree'; this book



has helped inspire us to write letters to the President of Indonesia (President Joko Widodo) about the impact of deforestation. We are hoping that we will get a response from him!

We have also been learning about the layers of the Rainforest; the shrub layer, under story, canopy and emergent layer. Each layer is the habitat for so many different species of animals and we will be researching these more next half term. We have also looked at the climate and used atlases to explore the world and tropics of Capricorn and Cancer. This has helped us to understand the

difference between Tropical
Rainforests and Temperate
Rainforests.





In Science we have been examining flowers and the adaptation of plants in different regions of the world. We have identified parts of a plant, looked at water transportation through an experiment and now understand what a plant needs in order to grow into a healthy species. We also learnt about a plant that smells revolting, like dead meat, that you can see occasionally at Kew Gardens; The Corpse Plant!

As well as being busy in school we have visited MRC for the 'All Sing' event. This was run by Miss Wood and we all had a fantastic time. Lots of Year 3 classes from across the Rother Valley attended and we learnt some musical terms as well being able to sing a variety of songs such as 'Kookaburra', 'Five little monkeys' and a round 'Swing low, sweet chariot' with 'When the Saints' and 'I'm gonna sing'. It was great fun.
