MUSIC WITH MRS STEVENS

In music this term, the children are enjoying learning to play gamelan instruments. Gamelan is the traditional ensemble music of Java and Bali in Indonesia and is played at ceremonies at village festivals and to accompany dance.

The children have to show the same care and respect that is given to gamelan instruments in Indonesia and understand that it is culturally rude to play gamelan while wearing their shoes and that they should not step

over any of the instruments.

The most common instruments are metallophones played with a mallet as well as gongs and a set of hand played drums. The instruments are mounted on elaborately carved gold wooden frames.

The children have to listen and watch each other carefully as they all play an important part in each piece of gamelan music.

ECO CLUB:

Eco-Schools was founded in 1994, operates in 67 countries and engages 19.5 million young people globally. This makes Eco-Schools the largest educational programme on the planet. On March 23rd our application was approved and we very proudly join the largest educational programme looking after our planet. The Eco team have been fundamental in makina this happen, and have done an exceptional job, especially with Covid interrupting time at school. We now start the process again focusing this time on 5 areas of sustainability which we will share with you in more depth over the coming months. Hedgehogs Class met Harry the Hedgehog and learnt a lot about these lovely animals. We found out what they eat, where and when we can see them and that they are becoming extinct. To help look after them we have adopted a hedgehog from the Wildlife Trust. We will be receiving a cuddle toy, information and stickers, which should be arriving shortly, to help us remember to look after nature. Science this week was also nature orientated with the children heading out to the bank to try and identify different plants. They used a colour swatch to talk about the variation in colour in each plant and pictures to help them identify the names of the plants and did some careful observation drawing, using a magnifying glass to help them see all the details.

We started the week in Squirrels with a visit from the 'Hedgehog man'. We met 'Harry' who wasn't very shy and came out to say hello to us all. This was great fun and linked well to our topic although we found out that hedgehogs are actually predators for many of our little minibeasts! We have also been learning how to investigate in Science as it can sometimes be tricky to learn and research new things. As helpful as Google is, it doesn't give us time to find out for ourselves using other methods such as surveying, recording over time or classifying.
